

## Relpax<sup>®</sup> (eletriptan) – First-time generic

- On July 25, 2017, generic versions of Pfizer's <u>Relpax (eletriptan)</u> 20 mg and 40 mg tablets were launched.
  - <u>Teva launched</u> an <u>AB-rated</u> generic version of Relpax.
  - <u>Greenstone launched</u> an authorized generic version of Relpax.
  - In addition, Zydus received <u>FDA approval</u> of an <u>AB-rated</u> generic version of Relpax. Launch plans are pending for this product.
- Relpax is a serotonin (5-<sub>HT1B/1D</sub>) receptor agonist (triptan) indicated for the acute treatment of migraine with or without aura in adults.
  - Use only if a clear diagnosis of migraine has been established. If a patient has no response to the first migraine attack treated with Relpax, reconsider the diagnosis of migraine before Relpax is administered to treat any subsequent attacks.
  - Relpax is not intended for the prevention of migraine attacks.
  - Safety and effectiveness of Relpax have not been established for cluster headache.
- Other generic triptans are available: <u>almotriptan</u>, <u>frovatriptan</u>, <u>naratriptan</u>, <u>rizatriptan</u>, and <u>sumatriptan</u>.



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
